Year Group Updates

Little Chads

During the last 2 weeks at Little Chads, we have been looking at the work of famous artists and recreating their style in our own paintings. We looked at the artist Piet Mondrian and painted squares and rectangles using masking tape to define the straight lines. We have also looked at painting 'still life' pictures in the style of Frida Kahlo. The children looked carefully at the shapes of the fruit as well as mixing the correct colours.

Nursery

This week we have continued our topic, 'How will it grow?' We have been looking at what happened to our cress seeds. We have also been sorting different seeds using tweezers. It was tricky to pick up the sunflowers seeds with the tweezers, the broad beans were much easier!

Next week our theme is 'Jack and the Beanstalk'.

Reception

This week we have been learning all about the Police and Fire service. We have been detectives by looking at clues and trying to solve who destroyed the three little pigs' houses. We then made 'wanted' posters for the villains. Using the small world fire house we created scenarios and also made our own emergency vehicles using cardboard boxes and paint.

Year 1

Thank you to all the parents and carers who attended the phonics screening meeting on Monday. Those who were unable to attend please can you check your child's book bag for the information leaflet.

This week has been another busy week for us. We have been identifying evergreen and deciduous trees, finding halves and quarters of shapes and writing stories.

Year 2

All of the children in Year 2 have worked extremely hard this week to complete their end of KS1 assessments. We are proud of every one of them!

During the afternoons we have been using a variety of materials to create pictures of flowers. We learnt a little about Vincent Van Gogh and painted our own sunflowers before moving on to observational drawings of violas. We learnt that we had to look carefully at what we were drawing so that our drawings were as life-like as possible. We have some talented budding artists!

Year 3

Year 3 have looked at non-chronological reports about the infamous 'Supertato' this week. There have some brilliant actions used when retelling! In Maths we have tackled chunking but look out for some extra practice homework coming soon!

Year 4

This week Year 4 have been looking at poetry! We have been performing different poems during guided reading and have been looking at The Sound Collector by Roger McGough during our writing sessions. As we have completed a sound survey in our topic work, we have created our own poem explaining the sound collectors visit to Chadsmead!

Year 5

This week we have been looking at different poems about gardens. We compared 'The Glory of the Garden' by Rudyard Kipling to 'Grandad's Garden' by Melanie Waters and shared ideas for our own garden poems. In Topic, we named each part of a flower and explained the role each part plays in fertilisation. We also enjoyed working with a partner to find the country of origin of some exotic fruits and vegetables. Finally, we wrote about 'The Day in the Life of a Farmer'.

Year 6

Year 6 have had a refreshing week this week. We have spent a lot of time focusing on our writing post SATs but have also spent a lot of time being energetic and dancing. We were grateful to Mrs Griffiths for voluntarily coming in to teach us two separate dance routines on Monday, (one for the boys and one for the girls), which we have then spent some time memorising and practising. We will continue with this and hopefully evaluate, edit and improve them over the course of next week with the intention of performing them some time during the second half of the summer term.
