

Message from Mrs Grainger

Gardening Club

Now that all of the hard work (building the raised beds behind the glass corridor) has been completed, the Gardening Club has moved on to the fun activity of planting them up.

Each bed represents, one of the senses; sight, smell, taste and touch with the central tree representing sound. The plants chosen look to show the sense in a variety of ways, soft or spikey, sweet or savoury, winter or summer and nice or nasty. These areas will become a valuable teaching resource across the whole school and support many theme topics.

The first bed to be planted this week is the Touch-Bed. This area has been divided in to "Soft" and "Spikey". Grasses, ferns and angel wings show plants can be smooth and silky to the touch. The Spiky Mahonia "shouts" beware I might hurt but is a firm favourite for hungry bee and bugs in the winter.





For added weirdness the two halves are connected by succulent plants with weird rosesettes, conical tentacles and spikey flowers! The planting will be on going for the next few months to ensure that we have a collection of plants which look good whatever the season, so keep your eyes peeled.

Years 1 & 2

Hi everyone. We have had a fabulous week again this week. We have been thinking about making changes to the 'One Giant Leap' report about the moon landing, by adding our own adjectives for description.

In maths, we have been adding and subtracting by counting on and back and using part whole models to support our learning.

Years 3 & 4

Years 3 & 4 have been working on a variety of ways to answer questions in our book - The Iron Man by Ted Hughes.

We have used different skills to retrieve information from the text by scanning the text for key words and phrases which appear in the question.

A little bit harder than that, we have used our inference skills to answer questions where the answer is not so explicit. We call these 'I think because...' questions and it can be quite hard for the children to put 2 and 2 together and come up with the answer.

Also and perhaps most challenging is when we have to sequence different parts of the text in the right order in order for it to make chronological sense!

All of these reading skills are practised regularly and any practice of these at home when you hear your child read would be really useful!

We have also been enjoying our PE with Mr Squire and it has been lovely to see how children have improved over the last few weeks.



Years 5 & 6

Years 5 & 6 have almost reached the end of our ID theme and our class text, Wonder. In English, we have all been writing stories in a school setting and we look forward to hearing some of them read aloud. To enable safe use of the computer room, each class has taken turns for a week to complete this half term's unit of work. Children have been learning about vector drawings and have used PowerPoint to learn a wide range of skills. Oak and Elder have now completed theirs and Birch will be doing this next week.

There are still some children coming to school without coats: this is essential as the weather gets cooler. Pupils will take breaks outside unless rain is heavy so please don't let your child leave home without their coat. Thank
