

Message from Mrs Grainger

I hope that you all had an enjoyable half term break. We seem to be enjoying a spell of good weather – long may that continue!

Please remember to send your child in with a suitable hat to wear at playtimes and that you apply cream BEFORE YOUR CHILD COMES TO SCHOOL. Children need to have had their hay fever medication before they come in to school and bring a water bottle with them. Please ensure all belongings are named and labelled.

We continue to wait and see exactly what the Government decide with regard to the further relaxing of lockdown restrictions from June 21st. As I have stated previously in communications, we follow the guidance provided by the Department for Education and Public Health England. We will be guided by this before making any changes to the measures that we have in operation at school. Once clear, I will communicate any change to you in the normal way. As has been the case throughout, headteachers do not get any advance warning from the Government of changes that affect our schools and I find out by watching the same news briefings as you all do. Then we usually have to wait a week before we are provided with the actual detailed guidance. Subsequently, your patience is always appreciated.

You will receive your child's end of year report as normal in July. If your child received remote education from January to March, this will be included in the report. You will also have the opportunity to discuss your child's report with their teacher at the end of year.

Years 1 & 2

Well we had a VERY exciting first day back after half term! We received messages from Mr Farmer and Mrs Grainger saving that there had been a dinosaur roaming the school grounds! We watched some video footage of the dinosaur chasing Mrs Grainger in the hall and wandering around Apple class! We decided to investigate and see if we could find any evidence to help us decide which dinosaur it was. We found some footprints outside the classroom and followed them until we discovered some dinosaur eggs! They were lined up neatly in a line - another clue! When we got back to the classroom we used fact files and the iPads to find out which dinosaur it could have been. After reading carefully, we found out that it was an apatosaurus. We were so excited! This was all to start our new theme "Dinosaur Planet".

In writing lessons, we have been reading and retelling "The Good Dinosaur" and learning about friendship tales. Cherry class have also begun reading some nonfiction texts about dinosaurs in our reading lessons. We wrote our own questions for the texts - hopefully we'll find out the answers in the coming weeks!

Years 3 & 4

It has been lovely seeing the children return to school after a great, sunny half term - everyone looks well and rested!

We have begun our new theme called Gods and Mortals which is all about Ancient Greece. Later in the term (wb 05.07.21) we will be having a 'Greek Olympics' dress up day where children will need to come to school wearing an Ancient Greek outfit (toga style is fine!!). In maths this week, Year 4 have been working really hard working out rules which can be applied to different patterns. Year 3 have spent a lot of time working with scales as they have been learning all about measure. It has been interesting starting our theme with some map work and the children have enjoyed locating different countries in Europe.

Years 5 & 6

We have begun and are really looking forward to our new theme titled 'Tomorrows World'. We have looked at a timeline of tech' based inventions and then researched some famous people that have changed the world of technology. We have debated which of these influenced our world the most. We have also started to read our new book 'Skellig', which has already got us hooked. In writing, we have written a biography of David Almond who is the author of Skellig. Whilst in maths, we have been solving problems related to addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

The Year 6's have also been looking at their transition to high school by carrying out a series of lessons titled 'Go Big Be Awesome'.

We have another exciting week planned next week where Year 6 will be tackling their Mission, Survive and Thrive event.

The Big Bee Challenge

The Big Bee Challenge is Radio 2's brand new competition for children, in partnership with the Royal
