1. Scope and definitions

This addendum applies during the period of school closure due to COVID-19, and reflects updated advice from our the DFE and local authority (LA) – Staffordshire County Council.

It sets out changes to our normal child protection policy in light of the Department for Education's guidance <u>Coronavirus</u>: <u>safeguarding in schools, colleges and other providers</u>, and should be read in conjunction with that policy.

Unless covered here, our normal child protection policy continues to apply.

The Department for Education's (DfE's) definition of 'vulnerable children' includes those who:

- > Have a social worker, including children:
 - With a child protection plan
 - · Assessed as being in need
 - · Looked after by the local authority
- > Have an education, health and care (EHC) plan

2. Core safeguarding principles

We will still have regard to the statutory safeguarding guidance, Keeping Children Safe in Education.

Although we are operating in a different way to normal, we are still following these important safeguarding principles:

- > The best interests of children must come first
- > If anyone has a safeguarding concern about any child, they should continue to act on it immediately
- > A designated safeguarding lead (DSL) or deputy should be available at all times (see section 4 for details of our arrangements)
- > It's essential that unsuitable people don't enter the school workforce or gain access to children
- > Children should continue to be protected when they are online

3. Reporting concerns

All staff and volunteers must continue to act on any concerns they have about a child immediately. It is still vitally important to do this.

Staff report concerns using the log of concern document and then speak with a DSL. That may be in person as they are on the premises or by telephone if not. The member of staff will not leave school until a DSL has been spoken to. Staff are also aware of the safeguarding advisory line and reporting to Staffordshire Local Authority directly.

As a reminder, all staff should continue to work with and support children's social workers, where they have one, to help protect vulnerable children.

4. DSL (and deputy) arrangements

During these times it is not possible to always have a trained DSL or deputy DSL on site. If our DSL (or deputy) can't be in school, they can be contacted remotely.

Details of all important contacts are listed in the 'Important contacts' section at the start of this addendum.

If there is not a DSL on premises the first contact will be the Headteacher. After that it will the team Leader for each week, given in the staffing rotas.

We will ensure that DSLs (and deputies), wherever their location, know who the most vulnerable children in our school are.

5. Working with other agencies

We will continue to work with children's social care, and with virtual school heads for looked-after and previously looked-after children.

We will continue to update this addendum where necessary, to reflect any updated guidance from:

- > GOV.UK
- > The local authority about children with education, health and care (EHC) plans, the local authority designated officer and children's social care, reporting mechanisms, referral thresholds and children in need

6. Monitoring attendance

As most children will not be attending school during this period of school closure, we will not be completing our usual attendance registers or following our usual procedures to follow up on non-attendance.

The exception to this is where any child we expect to attend school during the closure doesn't attend, or stops attending. In these cases, we will:

- > Follow up on their absence with their parents or carers, by making contact via the telephone
- > Notify their social worker, where they have one

We are using the Department for Education's daily online attendance form to keep an accurate record of who is attending school.

We have made contacts with parents and carers to make sure we have up-to-date emergency contact details, and additional contact details where possible for children that will be attending school in the closure period.

7. Peer-on-peer abuse

We will continue to follow the principles set out in part 5 of Keeping Children Safe in Education when managing reports and supporting victims of peer-on-peer abuse.

Staff should continue to act on any concerns they have immediately.

8. Concerns about a staff member or volunteer

We will continue to follow the principles set out in part 4 of Keeping Children Safe in Education.

Staff should continue to act on any concerns they have immediately.

If staff have a concern regarding another member of staff, they will contact the Headteacher. If they have concern regarding the headteacher they will contact Community Academies Trust safeguarding officer or Primary Director. Details of these important contacts are listed in the 'Important contacts' section at the start of this addendum. The role of the safeguarding Governors has been suspended during these unprecedented times.

We will continue to refer adults who have harmed or pose a risk of harm to a child or vulnerable adult to the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS).

We will continue to refer potential cases of teacher misconduct to the Teaching Regulation Agency. We will do this using the email address Misconduct.Teacher@education.gov.uk for the duration of the COVID-19 period, in line with government guidance.

9. Support for children who aren't 'vulnerable' but where we have concerns

We have the option to offer places in school to children who don't meet the Department for Education's definition of 'vulnerable', but who we have safeguarding concerns about. We will work with parents/carers to do this. This may include children who have previously had a social worker, or who haven't met the threshold for a referral but where staff have raised concerns.]

If these children will not be attending school, we will put a contact plan in place, as explained in section 10.1 below.

10. Safeguarding for children not attending school

10.1 Contact plans

We have contact plans for children with a social worker and children who we have safeguarding concerns about, for circumstances where:

- > They won't be attending school (for example where the school, parent/carer and social worker, if relevant, have decided together that this wouldn't be in the child's best interests); or
- > They would usually attend but have to self-isolate

These plans set out:

- > How often the school will make contact
- > Which staff member(s) will make contact
- > How they will make contact

We have agreed these plans with children's social care where relevant, and will review them when necessary.

If we can't make contact, we will be contacting children's social care or the safeguarding advice line:

10.2 Safeguarding all children

Staff and volunteers are aware that this difficult time potentially puts all children at greater risk.

Staff and volunteers will continue to be alert to any signs of abuse, or effects on pupils' mental health that are also safeguarding concerns, and act on concerns immediately. In particular, children are likely to be spending more time online (see section 11 below).

11. Online safety

11.1 In school

We will continue to have appropriate filtering and monitoring systems in place in school. We have support from our IT staff.

11.2 Outside school

Staff will not be interacting with children or parents/careers online outside of the normal communication routes. Normal communication is by using the school MyEd app and the office contact e-mail address.

Staff will not make phonecalls with children or parents unless they are classed as vulnerable. See section 10 of this addendum. This includes Google hangouts or any other video conferencing means.

Staff will continue to be alert to signs that a child may be at risk of harm online, and act on any concerns immediately, following our reporting procedures as set out in section 3 of this addendum.

Children and parents/careers can report any concerns they have, using the normal communications routes. School will try to sightpost them to other sources of support too.

11.3 Working with parents and carers

We will make sure parents and carers:

- > Are aware of the potential risks to children online and the importance of staying safe online
- > Are aware that they should only use reputable online companies or tutors if they wish to supplement the remote teaching and resources our school provides
- > Know where else they can go for support to keep their children safe online. Our website signposts to help: Parents and Families tab, E-safety.

12. Mental health

We will endeavor to signpost all pupils, parents and staff to other resources to support good mental health at this time.

When setting expectations for pupils learning remotely and not attending school, teachers will bear in mind the potential impact of the current situation on both children's and adults' mental health.

13. Staff recruitment, training and induction

13.1 Recruiting new staff and volunteers

We continue to recognise the importance of robust safer recruitment procedures, so that adults and volunteers who work in our school are safe to work with children.

We will continue to follow our safer recruitment procedures, and part 3 of Keeping Children Safe in Education.

In urgent cases, when validating proof of identity documents to apply for a DBS check, we will initially accept verification of scanned documents via online video link, rather than being in physical possession of the original documents. This approach is in line with revised guidance from the DBS.

New staff must still present the original documents when they first attend work at our school.

We will continue to do our usual checks on new volunteers, and do risk assessments to decide whether volunteers who aren't in regulated activity should have an enhanced DBS check, in accordance with paragraphs 167-172 of Keeping Children Safe in Education.

13.2 Staff 'on loan' from other schools

We will assess the risks of staff 'on loan' working in our school, and seek assurance from the 'loaning' school that staff have had the appropriate checks.

We will also use the DBS Update Service, where these staff have signed up to it, to check for any new information.

13.3 Safeguarding induction and training

We will make sure staff and volunteers are aware of changes to our procedures and local arrangements.

New staff and volunteers will continue to receive:

- A safeguarding induction
- > A copy of our children protection policy (and this addendum)
- > Keeping Children Safe in Education part 1

We will decide on a case-by-case basis what level of safeguarding induction staff 'on loan' need. In most cases, this will be:

- > A copy of our child protection policy and this addendum
- Confirmation of local processes
- > Confirmation of DSL arrangements

13.4 Keeping records of who's on site

We will keep a record of which staff and volunteers are on site each day, and that appropriate checks have been carried out for them.

We will continue to keep our single central record up to date.

14. Children attending other settings

Where children are temporarily required to attend another setting, we will make sure the receiving school is provided with any relevant welfare and child protection information.

Wherever possible, our DSL (or deputy) and/or special educational needs co-ordinator (SENCO) will share, as applicable:

- > The reason(s) why the child is considered vulnerable and any arrangements in place to support them
- > The child's EHC plan, child in need plan, child protection plan or personal education plan
- > Details of the child's social worker
- > Details of the virtual school head

We will share this information before the child arrives as far as is possible, and otherwise as soon as possible afterwards.

15. Monitoring arrangements

This policy will be reviewed as guidance from the LA or DfE is updated, and as a minimum every 4 weeks by Gemma Grainger, Headteacher.
